Key Challenges for 2014 Dialogue

- Strengthening a positive dynamic in US-Japan relations that have been strained by recent events
- Supporting Abe administration's measures to grow the Japanese economy, especially in the ICT area
- Highlighting threats to global Internet from assertions of "cyber sovereignty" and the need for US-Japan joint strategy on Internet governance
- Underscoring the key role of "sharing data" within Japan for economic growth and the importance of a framework for "cross-border data transfers" in promoting innovation and regional integration in Asia
- Stressing the need for deeper US-Japan coordination on cyber security before not after a major cyber crisis
- Starting a process to identify concrete projects for collaboration in context of 2020 Tokyo Olympics
- Reaffirming the importance of the multistakeholder process in bilateral ICT discussions and decisions

Key Results from 2014 Dialogue

- First bilateral meeting of MIC DG Sakamoto and US Amb for International Communications and Information Technology Sepulveda
- Reconfirmation of importance of ICT in Abe administration's growth plans
- Agreement to coordinate approaches to Internet governance issues in Sao Paulo and later at the ITU meeting in Korea
- Exchange on US and Japanese positions on global privacy policy, especially with regard to EU Data Protection norms
- Recognition of a need to do more bilaterally on cyber security
- Government openness to support practical cooperation between business sectors
- Explicit statements of support for deepening of the multistakeholder engagement between the two countries
- Commitment to report back to industry on government actions
